Giving Their Time

Madisyn Wimple | St. Jude House's Youngest Philanthropist

Madisyn Wimple's philanthropy began at the young age of six. "I couldn't figure out what I wanted for my 7th birthday, so I decided to look for a shelter to donate to. That's how we found St. Jude House," says Madisyn, now 12 and a 6th grader in Crown Point. She looked around her room

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and found toys to donate and asked her birthday party guests to bring an item on the St. Jude House wish list to donate. St. Jude House is a domestic violence shelter in Crown Point. Indiana that serves an average of 600 victims of domestic violence and their dependent children annually in a homelike shelter with comprehensive services for healing and hope. Says Madisyn, "My mom explained to me the kinds of things that happened and why they need help. I just tried to think about the positive things, like they are at the shelter, and they're getting help. I didn't really mind the fact that I didn't have any presents because I knew that I was going to help someone else."

That 7th birthday party was just the beginning. Each year for her birthday, more and more people and businesses have gotten involved, resulting in increased donations of critically-needed items as well as gas cards and cash donations for St. Jude House. With so many donations of toys, personal care and baby care items, microwaves, blankets, cases of water, cleaning products, clothing and more, the Wimple's rent a U-Haul to deliver them to St. Jude House.

Madisyn, with the help of her dad, Ryan and mom, Shaya, established Madisyn's Spread the Love Project. They also helped her set up a social media presence, where people are invited to make direct donations to St. Jude House. Ryan Elinkowski, director of St. Jude House says, "What young Madisyn has accomplished with her Spread the Love campaign has been such an inspiration for St. Jude House and the community. She is a shining example to all that the willing heart of one person can have a greater impact than ever imagined."

Two years ago, Madisyn was awarded the "Young Philanthropist" honor from the Association of Fundraising Professionals Northwest Indiana Chapter. "You are never too young to make a difference, no matter how small of an act, and it's never too late to help change someone's life," Madisyn said.

Madisyn envisions herself starting a not-for-profit so she can continue to spread the love. She knows she will need her mom and dad's help for that, but said she is committed to continuing to amass donations from her birthday party, distributing flyers, and inviting more businesses to participate in her *Spread the Love Project*.



"I want to open a business that does stuff like this all the time that collects donations for people who need it. It has taught me not to take anything for granted because other people might not have a lot," she said.

Giving Their Talent

Ron Stroup | Bringing His Gift of Magic to Residents of University Place

Ron Stoup, a 15 year resident of University Place, a Franciscan Ministries senior living community in West Lafayette, Indiana, has been intrigued and captivated by magic since he was a boy. When Ron was 12 years old, his older brother bought him a little magic set. His passion for the art lead him to spending hours at the library reading books on the subject and creating little magic shows for family and friends. So began Ron's lifelong pursuit of mastering the world of tricks and illusions.

As an electrical engineering major at Purdue University, Ron worked his way through school by doing magic shows. He had wanted to be a professional magician, but fell in love and married, knowing he had to get a real job to support a family which would grow to include five children. Ron's career as an electrical engineer necessitated family moves to the Chicago area, Atlanta, Philadelphia and Cleveland. In 2004, Ron's wife of 50 years passed away and Ron moved to University Place in 2005.

Every year since Ron moved in, he has shared his **talent** as a master magician through an annual magic show for 120 residents and invited guests. A major highlight of the year, the show features new and different tricks, including silk scarf, comedy and liquid magic.

This year's show, longawaited and eagerly anticipated, was especially important given the restrictions imposed by the pandemic, which precludes outside entertainment in order to keep residents safe. Held on a stage in the Great Room of the community with Ron's backdrop and props, two separate shows were held on October 14 and 15 to allow for social distancing. Ron says the actual performance is the easiest and most fun part. For months prior, Ron spends days planning and rehearsing, working with his assistant of 14 years, Margie Sharples, also a University Place resident and Ron's good friend and companion, to ensure a show that will delight his audience. Says Ron, "I want to make people smile and be happy."

The biggest hits of the show, Ron says, were the tricks featuring playing cards and dollar bills, disappearing/reappearing milk and finally, one where Ron and Margie produced a magic table out of thin air. Ron's only regret was that he, because of the social distancing requirement, could not ask for volunteers from the audience, which always adds to the fun.

Ron's enormous generosity of spirit and his talent make a difference at University Place, bringing joy to residents and associates. Ron participates in the community's Secret Prayer Partner group and recently he received a card with a note inside from his secret prayer partner, which sums up the wonderful gift he brings to all those around him: "God tells us to plant the seeds of the spirit and you are always ready with a smile and a joke." Rosa knows what it's like to overcome obstacles. A certified public accountant and managing partner at Andersen Tax since 2012, Rosa credits her Catholic high school education with much of her success. A 1991 alumna of Madonna High School, run by the Franciscan Sisters of Chicago, Rosa went on to college at DePaul University.

As the oldest of three children of an immigrant family, Rosa held down part-time jobs while studying at DePaul to help cover her educational expenses. Earning her degree took Rosa six years as she juggled work and school. Through her perseverance and hard work, she graduated from DePaul in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in accounting. She held accounting positions at Kraft Foods and Grant-Thornton before moving to her senior role at Andersen Tax in 2012.

The Madonna Foundation connected with Rosa several years ago at a Madonna High School reunion. The school closed in 2001 and from the proceeds from the sale of the building, the Madonna Foundation was established to carry on the legacy of the Franciscan Sisters of Chicago through the creation of the Madonna Scholars Program. The program provides scholarship support and college readiness programming to an annual average of 60 underserved teen girls who attend our partner schools: all six remaining all-girls Catholic high schools in the Chicago area.
